From the Pastor's Desk



TELEVISED LEADERSHIP DEBATES between candidates expose the weakness in the politics of the western democracies. At first they had real value, for the leaders spoke without relying on pre-determined soundbites or scripts. In 1984 during a presidential candidates debate between Ronald Reagan and Walter Mondale, Regan was told that he was the oldest ever president, and asked if he could cope with four more years; Reagan shot back that he refused to make an age an issue, and exploit his opponent's

youth and inexperience. Reagan was 73, Mondale was 56.

The recent candidates debate between Joe Biden and Donald Trump was between men of 81 and 78 respectively. Mr Biden was clearly mentally impaired, and even pre-prepared scripts and soundbites were beyond him. Mr Trump rarely sticks to scripts anyway, so he relished the occasion. In our own recent leaders' debate, both Rishi Sunak and Keir Starmer, much younger men, were not mentally, but politically impaired. Both relied overwhelmingly on prepared scripts and mantra-like soundbites, used to make noise and avoid directly answering direct questions.

Be they older or younger, our political leaders seem averse to giving direct answers to direct questions. In many ways, the 'leaders' are not leading at all, but are the figurehead mouthpieces for their party machines. The party political advisor has more real power than any senior civil servant, or even ministers of the crown. The satirical TV series *The Thick of It* mocked precisely this reality. The problem is: these advisors are not elected, and rarely even seen, and not accountable as civil servants and politicians are.

We are fortunate to live in a democracy that still merits that label. Yet we can only vote for those our system proposes to us. That the USA, with 336 million people, can propose only Biden and Trump as prospective leaders, shows the power of the party machines and the increasing irrelevance of leaders as leaders. Here, that both Sunak and Starmer could almost be reading, robotically, from the same script exposes our own leadership void. No political machine will ever give us leaders like Saint Peter or St Paul.

When we vote in this Thursday, and we all must who can, we will have a difficult choice to make, seemingly one between only bad or worse. But we *can* still make a free choice, even if only to spoil the ballot paper! So let us pray first, and then vote with our heads not our hearts, enlightened by our Christian faith, and not by ideology or tribal loyalties.
