From the Pastor's Desk



WHAT A STRANGE ELECTION it has been in so many ways. That it was called when it was is strange enough. There were strange happenings: eg, the actor pretending to be a Reform activist and saying outrageous things, or the Tory staffers—even police officers—with advance knowledge placing very accurate bets on the timing of the election. If you look at the news around the world our little scandals look insignificant indeed; inexcusable, but not seismic.

Indeed, this year is being touted as the great test of

democracy, as 64 countries have elections in 2024: the UK, the USA, India, France, Russia, Pakistan, South Africa, the EU, Iran, et al. Some of these are real elections, too many are shams, and some are democratic but with a narrow range of uninspiring choices. But what is democracy? Is an election in the UK comparable to one in Russia? Or even Australia? Labour has been returned with a landslide majority having received only 33.8% of the votes cast, yet gaining 412 of 650 seats. With such a supermajority Labour can impose its programme with little real scrutiny, even though 2/3 of voters did not want them. More bizarrely, Labour increased its vote by only 1.6% over 2019 when they lost to a (smaller) Tory landslide, and most of this 1.6% was in Scotland.

While our process is democratic, its structure is not really democratic because it is only partially representative. Reform UK got 14.3% of the vote but only 5 seats, the Lib Dems got 12.2% but 72 seats! The SNP got 2.5% of the vote (all in Scotland of course) and still managed 9 seats in Westminster despite its disastrous election. First-past-the-post is elegantly simple, but fatally flawed—in Blackburn, an Islamist independent was elected with only 27% of the votes cast; that means 73%—the vast majority—did *not* want him yet now must have him. The Australian preferential system makes much more sense.

What is my real point? We should ask ourselves what people really mean when they talk of democracy. We should ask what are democracy's virtues, and if they can actually be found in any particular system that claims to be democratic. But it also means that landslides—2019 vs 2024—are now inherently unstable. As in the Chinese curse, we live in interesting times. As Christians we should remember that our lasting citizenship is in another Kingdom, whose King shall reign forever, a Kingdom of Truth, and thus of peace, unity; an eternal Kingdom, and there only will we find our true and stable home. Christ's choice for us is far more important than any political choice we can make.
