From the Pastor's Desk



IT HAS NOT BEEN it a good couple of weeks for America's President Biden. He has had some strong points in his presidency, not least his unequivocal support for Ukraine, but as a *Catholic* president he has been something of a letdown, to say the least. In the last fortnight the media has finally taken notice of what has been apparent for the best part of the last year: that Mr Biden is in the early stages of dementia. Now his party is desperately seeking to nudge him out of standing for the next election. It is all a little bit

too late; they knew of his decline a long time ago but cynically kept him as their nominee on the assumption that since he had defeated Mr Trump once, he could do so again.

Dementia is no small thing, no laughing matter. We all know that in the early stages of dementia those who suffer it cannot comprehend its reality, and even deny it. It can be a hard slog to manage the decline while keeping sufferers' spirits up. We should also know that the sooner the reality of the onset of dementia is acknowledged, the less stressful (though hardly stress-less!) it becomes to manage. Those around Mr Biden have left him in an invidious position: he still thinks he can do the job, that he just has 'bad days,' and so the damage-control scrum around him is all the more distressing for everyone involved. Given he is the leader of what is still the world's most powerful nation, and the guarantor insofar as it can be of what remains of global stability, Mr Biden's plight affects more than just himself; it affects us as well.

It is an almost universal human trait to shrink from facing a hard reality. That is why so many forms of escapism have flourished throughout human history, especially in our day. Sin is one form of escapism. Sin is always an attempt to escape a situation we do not like, that is uncomfortable, unsettling, even painful, sometimes even evil. It involves a choice of what we *think* is good for ourselves personally, but which inevitably involves an affront or an injury to others, even—indeed especially—God. Sin is form of self-delusion; in opting for what appears a gain, we find it is a gain only temporarily (if at all) and that it has consequences for ourselves and others that we come to regret, often bitterly. Then we say to ourselves, 'If only I had not done that.' Sin in haste, repent at leisure, as they say.

We might pray this weekend for those who are afflicted with dementia, which cruelly cuts its sufferers off from reality. And let us pray for sinners, who seek to escape reality in ways ultimately futile and harmful. In both cases, they and others must bear the consequences.

An offering from the archdiocese

Liverpool Hope University has partnered with several Catholic dioceses across England and Wales to help people gain fresh perspectives on Scripture and Church teaching.
