#### **Dear Parishioners and Friends**

Jacinta Brown, St Bede's School Chaplain, came to St Anne's Parish Pastoral Council a few weeks ago and the PPC suggested it would be a good idea to have some communication between the school and the parish. Here is this month's uplifting input from some of the young people in St Bede's.

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**Conflict: Where is God?**

This week we are revisiting a tricky question that many of us as young Catholics ask ourselves as we watch and try to make sense of the terrible conflicts in the news today. A year on from a mass attack on Israel and the subsequent Israeli invasion and attacks on Gaza and now Lebanon, world leaders are calling for peace but things have only got worse. The violence in the Middle East keeps spreading.

After a year, a peaceful and just solution seems very distant and so, we might find ourselves asking a big question.

Why does God allow war?

If God is omnipotent and omnibenevolent, why doesn't he step in and take control and stop the war?

It's a question that for many people can become an obstacle to faith. David Hume, an atheist philosopher described suffering as "the rock of atheism." There is no doubt of the suffering caused by war, so we think it's incredibly important to address this question boldly. Rather than nervously resisting the question because we feel it could damage our faith; we see it as an opportunity to strengthen our faith. So, this week, this is what we have been discussing in our Liturgy meetings and what we now want to share with you. Where is God?

One's of God's greatest gifts to us is free will. God gave us freedom because he loves us. Free will means we are free to make our own decisions, to choose. We can do things right, but we can also things wrong. C.S Lewis, one of the most influential writers of the twentieth century offers us a very clear explanation of freewill, God and love.

"If a thing is free to be good, it's also free to be bad. And free will is what has made evil possible. Why then, did God give us free will? Because free will, though it makes evil possible, is also the only thing that makes possible any love or goodness or joy worth having."

To live like robots who can't think for themselves, who are not free to make decisions and choices is not freedom. We are not machines programmed to act in a certain way. A loving father who wants his child to be happy does not control and enforce rather seeks to see his child choose love freely and voluntarily.

And yet, we get it wrong. We choose the wrong path, then we blame God. War is ofour making. War is a result of us choosing the wrong path, We choose power and greed when what God wants us to choose is love and justice. War is the result of human beings wanting to run the show and have power. We don't use our freedom for God speaks to us through scripture and the Bible makes this very point, war is of our making. In James we read:

"Where do wars and fights come from among you? Do they not come from your own desires?" James 4:1

Our desire and greed for land, for territory and power and control is the common denominator in all conflicts we see unfolding across the world. Conflict and greed is completely contrary to the Kingdom God wants us to build, "For God is not a God of disorder but of peace." Corinthians 14:13. When we choose the wrong path, the path opposite to justice, love and peace, it would pain any loving father. God is no different. "Jesus wept" John 11:35. Understanding all of this and yet still blaming God for war, seems to us beyond audacious. We might ask, well why doesn't God remind us and warn us? Doesn't a loving parent warn, correct and reconcile, try to keep us on the right path? He does. He speaks and works through the words of the peacemakers, the advocates, the actions and appeals of the humanitarian workers who promote and advocate for peace. This is how God intervenes, this is how God tries to keep us on the right path, through the people who are waving the signposts displaying the right direction to follow, we simply choose ignore them and God.

And what of the Church? Catholic Social Teaching is a source of wisdom which enables us to make the right choices, it guides us in our decision making as we enact our God given freewill. It's another one of the signposts which God offers us. Catholic Social Teaching, tells us that all human life is sacred and the dignity of every human being should be at the foundation of everything. War is completely contrary to this. How can land or territory ever be seen as more valuable than human life? Yet this is what we see unfolding. The Catholic Church makes it quite clear that we should work tirelessly to avoid war. We are responsible for creating just systems which eliminate injustice, marginalisation and oppression. We believe, to be a Catholic is to actively participate, not observe passively. This is true of our leaders too. We believe that leaders should strive in every way possible to prevent conflict, with power comes responsibility, it is their duty.

The question is do we, in our freedom, choose fairness, truth, justice and solidarity, in order to bring about true peace? Or do we make the wrong choice and then blame God?

### St Anne's Church Roof Update

Thank-you to everyone for your ongoing support for the Church Roof Appeal...through regular Direct Debit Donations or from the events that groups are kindly running to support us. I am also pleased to say that we are receiving Gift Aid payments as a result of the donations.

We are now in a position to start the Tower restoration, the most complex and therefore expensive phase that we have taken on. At this point, the Roof Fund does not have all the funds needed, so I am grateful to the Parish who have extended a 'loan' to enable the work to start.

We will completely replace the roof of the Tower and its guttering. In addition, we will replace the louvres on the sides of the tower and remedy other stonework problems in this area. Much of the work will be undertaken at height and following a bat survey we must also complete it during Bat hibernation season.

At the start of January, you will start to see scaffolding being erected, with the whole project targeted to be completed around Easter 2025.

There may be some restrictions on Church access routes and services in this time, which we will communicate in the Bulletin.

I will issue a more detailed Newsletter early in January to keep you updated on the progress of the penultimate stage of our project. Once again this would not be possible without your very generous and ongoing support **Phil Wilkinson**
